Dear Mayor Mamdani and Chancellor Samuels,

We ask that you immediately pause the use of Generative Artificial Intelligence in our schools. Thousands of NYC parents and teachers have [signed a petition](#) called for a two-year AI moratorium. [An open letter](#) was recently released by the organization Fairplay, signed by more than 200 organizations and experts, including medical professionals, calling for a five-year moratorium nationally on the use of AI in schools, because of its risk to student learning and mental health.

The Brookings Institution has [issued a report](#), concluding *“After interviews, focus groups, and consultations with over 500 students, teachers, parents, education leaders, and technologists across 50 countries, a close review of over 400 studies... we find that at this point in its trajectory, the risks of utilizing generative AI in children’s education overshadow its benefits.”*

Yet the draft AI guidance posted by the NYC Department of Education is flawed and fails to address the primary concerns of parents and education researchers. It contains no proposals to strengthen the privacy and security of the personal student data collected by AI companies, despite the [NY State Comptroller’s audit](#) showing that DOE’s current privacy policies and processes are riddled with numerous technical failings and are non-compliant with the NY State Ed Law 2D, the student privacy law. This has led to more than 100 student data breaches in recent years and inordinate delays in notifying families past the legal deadline.

Moreover, the AI guidance received no input from parents or teachers before posting, other than an AI Advisory Council, appointed by former Chancellor David Banks, composed primarily of top DOE administrators and ed tech industry representatives. Most crucially, it offers no measures on how the documented risks of AI will prevent student learning, cognitive development, basic skills, creativity, critical thinking, mental health, and the environment.

Even now, before the guidance is finalized or public feedback taken into account, DOE appears to be rushing in and expanding the use of AI for children as young as in PreK. Officials have placed dozens of new AI products on the TeachHub site in the last few weeks, encouraging principals and teachers to assign them, including Google Gemini, which prompts students as young as third grade to use AI when they write or draw pictures.

We urge you to hold off and pause the use of AI in our schools except for education on the multiple risks in employing the technology until rigorous guardrails can be developed with public and expert input, to prevent serious damage to NYC children and their future.




